Notes from the Hiking Chairman, Dona Agosti:

We will try to have a rough draft of next year's hiking schedule available at the next meeting. At that time you can let me know your ideas for new and different, on or two days hikes. In the meantime, I skied cross country near Gunsight Mountain Lodge on October 26th. We prevailed upon a couple of snowmachiners to take us to the plateau below Belanger Pass, then skied down a mile or more on good powder and a rather gentle slope. The snow is about a foot deep, and if you don't mind sharing with snowmachines, you can alleviate some of the strain of waiting for snow here in Anchorage. 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Minutes of General Meeting, MCA, October 16, 1974, 8:00 PM, Pioneer Schoolhouse, 3rd & Eagle, Anchorage, Alaska.

Meeting was called to order by Bill Barnes Jr. and was followed by Bill Quirk's slides of a climb near Summit Lake and a MCA ski tour to Kick-step Mountain.

Minutes of the September meeting as they appeared in the October Scree were approved. The Treasurer's report showed Income of \$27.00 and expenses of \$98.63. Total cash in savings, checking, and on hand was \$1164.23.

Climbing Chairman, John Pinamont, said that a ski-tour to Fern Mine Cabin was planned for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, November 22, 23, and 24th, which is the Thanksgiving weekend. Group will leave Valu-Mart parking lot at 6:30 AM on Friday. Others may wish to join the group on Saturday.

A week-long expedition to Mt. Sgt. Robinson is planned for Nov. 2-10, with John Pinamont leading. A meeting to discuss plans will be held on Monday, October 21, upstairs at AMH, Spenard Road. All participants will be asked to pay \$40.00 at that time which will cover communal food supplies.

Since the hiking schedule is contingent upon weather, MCA hikes will be planned on an unofficial basis. Check with Dona Agosti, 279-2901. Pam Stevens, Sierra Club, invited MCAs to join them on a one-day, 6-mile round trip to Lower Russian Lake, Saturday October 19. The hike will be led by Alan Sherry and hikers will meet at Valu-Mart at 7:30 AM Saturday.

Bob Spurr, Geographic Names Committee, had no report, but Helen Nienheuser reported that she had visited with Margaret Murray in Colorado last spring. The latter is a well-known ex-Alaskan and author of "Two In The Far North" who would like to see the name Mt. McKinley changed to Denali. She had written to the Board of Geographic Names who informed her that the request must come from within Alaska. She asked Helen's help in furthering this idea. In addition, the Denali Citizens Council, headed by Ev Drashner of Cantwell, has asked for legislative action through John Sackett to affect this name change. Motion was made by Helen Nienheuser and seconded by Robin Bowen that the Mountaineering Club of Alaska write to John Sackett endorsing the name change for Mt. McKinley. Motion unanimously passed.

In answer to a query about the condition of Eklutna Cabin, a gentleman reported that as of three weeks ago, the windows seemed to be intact, but there was yet a considerable amount of garbage in the area.

Motion made by Robin Bowen and seconded by John Pinamont that we waive the requirement which states that names of nominees for office be published three weeks in advance of an election; also that the names of Raj Bhargava for Vice-President, Kit Kenney for Treasurer, and Bill Barnes Sr. for 2-year Board position be accepted for nomination. Passed with no opposition.

Kit Kenney was unanimously elected Treasurer.

Nina Faust was nominated by Bill Barnes Jr. for position of Secretary. Discussion followed, nominations were then closed and Nina Faust was unanimously elected Secretary.

Raj Bhargava was unanimously elected Vice-President.

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The names of John Samuelson, Gayle Nienheuser, Trent Swanson, John Pinamont, Leo Hannan, Bill Stivers and Dona Agosti were placed in nomination for the position of President, but all were either not present or declined. Bill Barnes Sr. then nominated Lt. Al Worland, who accepted and was then unanimously elected President.

Dona Agosti nominated Terry Reese for the position of 2-year Board Member. Terry Reese was unanimously elected to the 2-year board position. Bill Barnes Sr. was also unanimously elected to the 2-year board position. (Dave DeVoe had withdrawn his name previously.)

Under new business, Helen Nienheuser said that the Seattle Mountaineers, publishers of "55 Ways to the Wilderness in South Central Alaska" had indicated that the first printing was about depleted and had asked for revisions before the second. Helen asked MCA members for help in reporting changes, possibly on a form to be included with the next issue of Scree.

Robin Bowen asked if there were any further developments on the climbing wall and Bill Barnes Jr. said Mike Richardson had reported nothing new.

Robin also asked if there were any plans to grade climbs in the Anchorage area. Bill Barnes Jr. said he thought there was definite interest in a publication of this kind, and that Dick Montague might possibly publish it.

Ten MCA members met at the Valu-Mart parking lot October 12th at 8:00 AM. The skies were clear when we started out at Rainbow Creek where we showed the members of the party the objective, the highest point of the ridge that divides McHugh Creek from Rainbow Creek.

The group consisted of Mike Sweet, Glen Bradford, Barry & Ruth Kircher, Raj Bhargava, Marian Rainey, Terry Reese, Sharon, Dave & Carol DeVoe and "TD" DeVoe.

While still on the Rainbow Creek road and before coming to the gully marked by a big cottonwood tree, we stopped and had a short chat with Art Davidson, who lives in the Rainbow Valley.

We made our way up the gully through the trees and then followed the steep ridge to the top. The day was warmer than anticipated in the morning and several long rests were enjoyed, soaking up the sun and visiting.

Our nice warm day started to change as we approached the ridge top. Wind blown clouds moving in from the southeast were soon scudding over our heads. Fierce gusts blasted us along the ridge to the summit, filling our eyes with fine blinding snow. We picked our route along the ridge to the summit, trying to avoid the steep hard-packed snow on the McHugh Creek side and the vertical drop on the other. We huddled in the shelter of the large shattered rocks for a short log signing session before facing the windy ridge again.

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Off Road Vehicle Regulations in the Mill For Chugach National Forest

Scott Harrison of the U.S. Forest Service is currently collecting information which will be used to formulate regulations for off road vehicle use in Chugach National Forest. Scott is asking for input from all those familiar with Chugach National Forest. He is particularly interested in specific data: hazardous areas (avalanche and rock slide areas, etc.) that would be adversely effected by moderate to heavy use, areas that are currently posing competitive use problems, and any other information that might be helpful in evaluating the area relative to off road vehicle use. 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On November 4, the executive board discussed the possibility of raising club membership dues from \$2.50 to \$5.00 for juniors and out-of-town members, from \$5.00 to \$7.50 for singles, and from \$7.50 to \$10.00 for families. Several reasons for the increase were discussed. First, the dues have not been raised since 1958. Second, the cost of publishing Scree has increased over the years. Just materials cost approximately \$600.00 per year. A years supply of paper costs \$160.00, ink \$37.00, Labels \$5.00, stencils \$15.00, postage stamps \$360.00, and inflation about \$23.00. Furthermore, unless some dedicated people volunteer to

help type and paste labels on Scree, someone may have to be paid to do this. The cost of publishing Scree would then be well over half the budget of the mountaineering club. The board feels that for the club to continue publishing Scree and to also have money for other projects such as maintaining cabins and purchasing equipment, an increase in dues is necessary. The proposal to raise club dues will be brought before the club for a vote at the November general meeting.
